But, if I stop reading, I will turn on the television and discover the more evils of the world and why I should just stay home and never leave. From chemicals in manufactured products to our healthcare system to jobs not available for people who want them to what our kids are learning in school. It seems like everyone has to tell the masses who has wronged them and how to protect yourself from those evil people and/or things.

It also seems that every message that I receive is that I'm not good enough and that if I buy this product, do something "this way" then I will be absolutely outstanding in every way – until I listen to the next commercial. Pick a racial/ethnic group, an age demographic, income level, and a gender. There is something wrong with you.

On one hand, we're created that way – not perfect. And that's okay. On the other hand, forgetting that we are created beings of God and are beautiful and wonderful isn't okay. We all fall short of who God created us to be, but that does not give anyone else license to exploit our weaknesses and exponentially increase them.

I miss conversations about grace – grace that reminds us that no, we're not perfect, but we have the confidence in ourselves as God's beloved children to move on in a process that builds healing and wholeness. I miss hearing that message that in confidence of God's love we can work to become the people God intended us to be – because God is building in us, not that others are tearing us down.

Our culture tells us that if you have a problem, there is a pill to take or some other magic fix – if you only do "this." Our faith tells us that as one of God's beloved children, created in the image of God, that there is something else to do – gather around the Table of Grace on Sunday mornings, receive symbols of God's grace (yes, the pellet of bread and the thimble of wine require us to use our imaginations to envision the Boundless Feast we embrace), and let their meaning guide us on our journey toward healing and wholeness. CHURCH LIFE UPDATES (from Kyle)

Since the last publication of "The Caller" many things in the life of our congregation have changed. For one, "The Caller" hasn't been published because on May 17 our beloved Anne McMahon suddenly passed away. Her death has left a void in our hearts as well as the operations of the church. Over the last few months, along with the leadership of the church, I have attempted to get some things picked up, cleaned up, and carried forward into a new day of how we conduct business as First Christian Church. So, let me update you, the congregation, on a few questions you have.

First, what's going on with the finances of the church? At the May 21 Board meeting, the Board voted to outsource the paying of the bills and organization of money collections with Bookkeeping Plus, a local accounting firm. This business is owned by Carla Ralston, a former member of our church and a trusted community business. To this point, Carla and her staff have done an excellent job in making sure all of our bills are paid, the money collected is accurately accounted, and confidentiality is maintained. Bookkeeping Plus operates the business under the direction of Charles McDonald, Treasurer, and weekly financial activities maintained and are consistently reported. *(continued on page 5 see "UPDATES")*

Second, how is the office managed? As you may know, Anne maintained office hours from 8:30-4:30 Monday through Thursday. I am in the office two days a week for a portion of that time, especially since my duties as Pastor take me out of the building for a time when I am in town. While phone messages are received and returned, it's not the same as having a live, friendly voice answer the church phone and some of those important things take a day or two to get done.

Two things are in the works: 1) along with the Board Officers (who serves as the Personnel Committee), I am drafting a new job description for the position of "Office Manager" to be filled in the coming months. With the finances outsourced, the skills and expectations of the traditional "Church Secretary" are different. So, we will be looking for someone who has a different set of skills than what we expected of Anne and previous church secretaries.

2) In the meantime, several folks have offered to volunteer their time to help get some of the administrative task completed. **On Thursday, August 10 at 11:30 am (immediately following the CBS program) there will be an "Office Volunteers Orientation."** In this session, I will give an overview of the office functions, a list of tasks to be performed, and answer any questions volunteers might have for the office. No experience is required -- just a desire to help. It's no secret that the office needs a little organizational TLC. We will put our heads together and develop a plan to reorganize the office and set new procedures for maintaining the office. *(continued in "Final Update")*
